

Delivering Impact

Remote Response

The move to remote learning during the COVID-19 Pandemic challenged many teachers and students. Granite United Way's investment in Reading Plus®, a technology-based reading program, helped middle school students continue to improve their reading, even when schools were closed. The technology kept teachers informed of students' participation and progress. Over the course of the academic school year, over 2,200 students saw an average of 1.7 years of reading improvement.

Building Resources

Despite the social distancing of the COVID-19 Pandemic, Granite United Way's Youth Enrichment Partnership continued to bring youth-serving staff together to build knowledge and skills through virtual training sessions. Staff from the Manchester School District and local nonprofit staff members were offered 14 different trainings throughout the spring of 2020, ultimately providing over 2,100 hours of training to those working with youth. Trainings included suicide prevention, trauma-informed practice, and child abuse awareness.



Connecting in Crisis

Granite United Way's COVID-19 Relief Fund has helped thousands of people across our state to meet their basic needs during the pandemic. In the Southern Region, NeighborWorks Southern NH, Greater Derry Community Health Services and Amoskeag Health have connected with local nonprofits to help clients who needed immediate relief to address challenges presented by the pandemic, assisting nearly 1,500 individuals in the community. For many, assistance was critical to meeting basic needs.



When the pandemic hit, Dominique had to give up her work to stay at home with her daughter, who has special needs. While Dominique worked around the clock to care for her daughter, she fell behind on rent and couldn't afford clothes for her children. Granite United Way provided Dominique with a gift card to pay for food, clothing, and wipes.
