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GRANITE UNITED WAY SELECTED TO LEAD NEW HAMPSHIRE OPIOID ABATEMENT COMMUNITY GRANTS PROGRAM

(Statewide, New Hampshire) — Granite United Way (GUW) has been selected by the New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services (NH DHHS) on behalf of the <u>NH Opioid Abatement Advisory Commission</u> to manage a new statewide Opioid Abatement Community Grants Program. This program, approved by Governor Ayotte and the Executive Council on June 25, 2025, will provide \$10 million in funding over the next two years to support projects that help communities combat opioid misuse and its effects.

Granite United Way will work closely with a Community Advisory Team—made up of experts, community members, and people with lived experience—to design and advise this grant program. Grants will be awarded in two main categories, aligned with <u>state law</u> and <u>priorities</u>:

- **Short-Term Grants:** Up to \$15,000 for one-time costs like technology, equipment, training, or events that meet immediate community needs.
- **Multiyear Project Grants:** Up to \$75,000 per year for up to three years to support ongoing projects that address local needs and involve strong community partnerships.
